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Reading Gladiators

On Tuesday 19th June 2018, Mrs Anstee and I accompanied our Year 4 Reading Gladiators to their challenge day at Woodville Primary, South Woodham Ferrers. We have been meeting every Wednesday morning to discuss the 8 exciting but challenging books we have been reading over the course of the year (although we do eat pain au chocolat as well).

On the challenge day, the first part consisted of Gladiators from each school sharing a presentation they had previously prepared to show their understanding of one of the books. Our Reading Gladiators chose *Little Bits of Sky*, an emotional book about two children growing up in foster care in late 1980s and early 1990s. They had costumes, acting, thought bubbles, artwork, newspaper articles and a wall with detachable bricks to show both the fall of the Berlin Wall and the emotional barriers of the main characters being lifted. As Caroline the judge pointed out, it looked like the children must have been practising for weeks. In fact, they only had four days to write their script and make props, and just over one day to practise!

After a fantastic start, it was time for the game show round. The children had prepared for this by rereading the 8 books and creating and sharing factfiles about each of them. Our Gladiators worked together to get their answers ready as quickly as possible. My favourite to watch was the charades round, where the children had to act out different characters for the others to guess. After lunch, the results were announced... Danbury Park Reading Gladiators had come second in the game show and first in the presentation, making them this year's East Essex Reading Gladiator champions!

Summer Events

We have lots of events for the second half of the summer term so please make sure you put dates which are at the end of this newsletter in your diaries.

Tuesday 17th July Sports Day



This year we will be using the same format for our Sports Day and Open Afternoon as last year. To save busy parents having to take two days off work we are combining the two events on the same day with the traditional picnic lunch in the middle. The provisional timetable for the day is:

The events will start with a carousel of activities stationed around the field in which all the children participate. At 11.30am the whole school will come together for the races on the main race track. We are already holding practices and trials in school so that for these races the fastest boys and the fastest girls will compete against each other. In keeping with the Olympic legacy the children will be earning points for their houses so that in Key Stage 2 we will have a house winner for each year group and then an overall winner. In the infants we will pool the points and have one overall house winner.

We hope to offer a tea and coffee station for parents. Drinks will be charged at a nominal rate to cover costs. For your comfort if you would like to bring blankets, seats and even gazebos, you are most welcome

Please remember to send the children in with water bottles and caps and apply a high factor sunscreen. All pre-school children must be kept under your direct supervision at all times and please note that the climbing tower and galleon will be out of use.

In the event of adverse weather we will make a decision as early as possible on the day as to whether events can go ahead. Please check the school website home page, scrolling news for the latest information. Regardless we will still hold the lunch for families and we will picnic in the school building if needs be and hold the open afternoon.

Safeguarding - Keeping Safe Online Child Exploitation

It was great to see such a fantastic turnout for our information session the other week on e-safety. The two Johns, as our consultants are known, prefer the term "online child exploitation" and I think this is a much more comprehensive way of describing the theme for the evening.

On the Wednesday afternoon the two Johns worked first with Classes Eider and Dove and then with Classes Cuckoo, Budgerigar and Avocet. This was a conscious decision as the content for the older children was a little more in-depth and harder hitting. The focus was very much the danger of apps and online games, which is what our children are interested in. Our children know an awful lot about the online world and they do know many of the answers when we question them about keeping safe but it is taking it to the next level and how they put this into practice and think about consequences.

After school, the two Johns went through the materials they had used with the children with the staff, adding in more background information and more explicit content so that we as adults could appreciate the risks. They then expanded on this for parents at the evening session. I know many of you are very technologically aware but it soon became apparent that the children know more about apps, gaming and the virtual world than adults. I know many of you were shocked and surprised to learn how easily children are being manipulated and exploited and the risks posed and how even if they do not play at home, they maybe at risk when visiting friends.

What was really useful were the strategies to support your children: i.e. **NOT** taking devices away or closing down apps, when things go wrong. The approach of talking to your children, exploring new apps together, talking through the dangers and helping them be part of this world is so much safer. Of course negotiating time spent online and establishing ground rules are also vitally important right from the start and this way you can help your child be part of something all their friends will be involved in, but in a safe way. This won't stop situations arising but we hope that the children will be able to talk to you (or us at school) should they encounter difficulties.

The analogy of the children being on a train journey when accessing the exciting digital world and how parents can choose to go along and help them interact with this new way of life or leave them to be exposed to risks and dangers on their own, was very apt.

If you couldn't make the meeting, find a friend who did and spend some time finding out more. As the two Johns suggested, why not have a drink and try out some of the apps that your children are using, yourself. Let's work together to keep the children safe!

Notices and Reminders

Year 6 School Lunch Money – A gentle reminder, as we approach the end of the academic year please could you ensure that all year 6 school meals are either paid for on the day or in advance.

Parking – Please think about the safety of our children and park with care and consideration before there is an incident where someone is seriously hurt.

Staying Safe – Please would parents prevent their children climbing on the wooden gates and on the brick wall at the entrance to the school and from going on the play equipment and behind the PE sheds by the playground. This is for their own safety
