We know that this means you may have read books other than ones we have in school but as long as they have been suitably challenging material, we will understand and take them into account. Weekly Update

This has been a very busy week in school following the Prime Minister's announcement last Sunday that if the country meets the government's five tests, schools will start to re-open as of 1st June for those children in Years R, 1 and 6 as well as providing childcare for the families of critical key workers where they have no alternative. As you can imagine this has caused a great deal of preparatory work and we are trying to consider ways in which we can make this happen whilst keeping the children and staff safe and operating within the guidance. We are still working on different scenarios but this will inevitably involve the redeployment of staff and modifying what we can provide in terms of online learning for those children still at home. The one certain thing is that teaching in school will not follow our normal routines, timetables or practices! I have include a letter from Clare Kershaw, Director of Education for Essex, at the bottom of this newsletter.

Thank you to all the parents of children in Reception and Years 1 and 6 for completing the survey sent out on Tuesday. I know that, understandably, you have many questions about school re-opening and that the answers to these may affect your decision. The number of children likely to be in school affects our scenarios as we need to keep the groups to under 15 children but probably even less because of the size of the rooms. At the beginning of next week, we will share with you our plans which I hope will help you.

I would like to take some time to thank our teachers for the fantastic job that they have been doing in providing learning resources and activities for the children. I know how much they would like to have normality restored and be with their classes in person. That interaction between teacher and pupil is so special and at primary age when a young child suddenly grasps a new concept (a "light bulb" moment), it is a privilege to witness. Behind the scenes the teachers are planning work, responding to the children on Google Classrooms, phoning families and proving pastoral support as well as coming in to supervise the children in school. They are missing the fruition of the academic year when they know the children very well and can see how much they have matured and progressed since September. They, like our supportive teaching assistants and admin staff, have gone above and beyond during this challenging time and I know how much you also appreciate this.

Please stay safe and support each other.

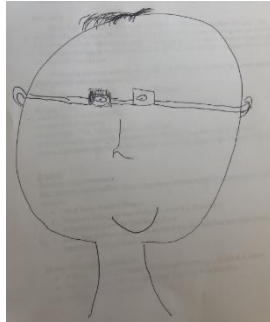
Self Portrait Challenge and Answers

The challenge was to draw a self portrait with your eyes shut.

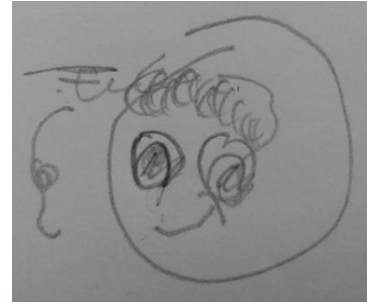

We've Got the water cycle in a bag

Equipment: sealable plastic sandwich bag, permanent marker, tap water, blue ink, and window with exposure to sunshine

My Prediction
The sun is going to heat the bag causing the water to evaporate then condensation then precipitation.

Method
We drew the water cycle on the bag and filled approximately 1/4 of the bag with water. Including the ink we taped the sealed bag onto a window.

Results
After a day the water had evaporated causing water vapor.

Conclusion
The sun heated the bag causing water vapor causing evaporation, condensation and precipitation.

Drawing of the Investigation

Results
The sun heated the compost and the caused Evaporation. The water evaporates by heat causing condensation on top of the cup. Then the water got too heavy it fell and caused precipitation.

Mental Health and Well-being

For some children the enormity of this crisis is going to be difficult for them and you as parents to manage. Below are some ideas of how you can support your children.

Top Tips for Parents

Talk to your children about what is happening and reassure them. They need to feel safe and secure in order to learn. And they need plenty of opportunities to talk, listen and play.

Establishing a routine is very important – but don't make it too rigorous. Make it about actions rather than time. Getting up slightly later is ok as long as children get dressed, have breakfast and clean their teeth, for example. And build in plenty of breaks – this is about fulfilling your child's needs and your own. Find something you want to do and build in self-care, downtime and a bit of boredom. It is that element of nothingness which enables creativity.

Have someone to talk to – connect with people. It is more important than ever before: whether on the phone, text, *WhatsApp* or *Facetime*, that connection will keep you sane and grounded – and give you some perspective on things that went well or badly.

Exercise – whatever that looks like, it will make you feel better.

Don't be too hard on yourself. Some days are better than others but try to look at it as a whole. Don't have unrealistic expectations of yourself or others – and give people time when they need it. It is more exhausting being at home and doing stuff online.

Try to change your mind set from thinking about all the things you can't do, to the opportunities that you do have – from tidying that cupboard, reading that book, to painting a mural on the fence. Small, achievable targets give satisfaction – and that is something to consider with homework. Think about the attention span of the child involved – 10 to 15 minutes of Maths is achievable. A prolonged period may not be. Even as adults we only tend to work in 30-minute bursts.

Try to separate the work space from the 'chill' space but remember learning is not just about English and maths – everyday life and its challenges can be a learning experience. Cooking, gardening or playing games for example, are all fun ways to learn – and can be used to develop key skills like reading, tables and division. The biggest learning curve for children can be having to wait for things. Having to plan and think a bit more and finding that not everything can be immediate is a great learning experience. Why not have discussions every so often around what they think they have learnt this week – and encourage children to keep a 'lockdown scrapbook' (perhaps online) to write about their activities? For older children you may just need to be a sounding board – in order to help them crystallise their project work, for example. Remember you don't need to solve their problems – you just have to listen. And encourage your teenagers to have conversations about things like the effect of the crisis on the economy going forward.

You may be aware that there is a consultation regarding the building of the Nuclear Power Station at Bradwell. We have been given these notices which we understand have been put through doors of houses in the village. Please check the details and have your say as we believe that this will involve additional traffic through the village and therefore impact on our school:

Proposals for the Construction of a New Nuclear Power Station at Bradwell - Public Consultation on Pre-Application Stage

The Parish Council will respond to this consultation and needs to hear your views (both positive and negative)

by - 31 May 2020
on the proposals for:

- Design and environment
- People and jobs
- Accommodation for workers
- Transport for freight and workers

Transport proposals being considered include the A14 through Danbury at the early stages of construction.

Public consultation ends on 3 July. If you do make a response directly, the Parish Council would appreciate a copy so that your views can be considered in the next stages of the consultation process.

Points to bear in mind when considering responses:

- The main areas to be considered for Danbury during this pre application stage consultation are Sections 4 and 5 of the Consultation Documentation available at <http://bradwellb.co.uk>
- Construction will take around 12 years to complete and start in approximately 2023 - providing there are no delays
- The construction site will be around 10 times the size of the current Bradwell Power station site and will involve up to 10,500 workers during the construction period with around 900 permanent jobs on completion
- There will be significant implications for increased HGV and other traffic movements along the A414 through Danbury for at least the early construction period of 1-3 years
- It is not clear whether traffic movements and volume through Danbury will change during the remainder of construction period
- The effect on the environment needs to be considered - the potential increase in pollution, noise and vibration levels as well as effects on the highways in terms of wear and tear....etc
- There may be job opportunities as a result particularly within transport, construction, technology and hospitality

Danbury Parish Council has a long standing policy on the provision of a bypass from Heybridge Approaches, Maldon across country by passing the villages of Ulting, Langford and Hatfield Peverel to a dedicated junction onto the A12 - this bypass would become the A414 enabling the current road to be downgraded to a B Road. This policy will form part of the Parish Councils response to the consultation

Dear Parent / Carer,

Coronavirus (Covid-19) Update – Phased Reopening of Schools

Firstly, I want to thank you once again for your contribution to the national response to the Coronavirus pandemic. For the majority of you, being at home with your child(ren) and supporting their continued learning, alongside your own work and wellbeing, is a significant challenge in what are both unprecedented and worrying times. However, we do know that this action has helped to reduce the spread of the virus and is helping to save lives.

I am sure that many of you will have watched the Prime Minister's address to the nation on Sunday evening and read subsequent details either online or in the media about the plans to begin to re-open schools more widely.

You will have heard the Prime Minister indicating that the government believes that as well as schools being open to the children of critical workers and for vulnerable pupils, it may be in a position to implement a phased re-opening of schools from 1st June at the earliest, starting with pupils in nurseries, reception, year one and year six. This will be in addition to accommodating children of critical workers and vulnerable pupils.

Secondary Schools and Alternative Providers are considering their approach to offering some face to face time for pupils and we are working with Special Schools on their plans to gradually increase the number of children and young people on site, again from the 1st June at the earliest.

This is part of the government's conditional plan which it says will remain under regular review, which is yet to be finalised and will only happen if the level of new infections continues to decrease and the government's other conditions are met.

We are working with schools to support their plans for a gradual and phased re-opening. Their plans will be guided by a thorough Health and Safety Risk Assessment taking in to account their physical capacity on the school site and staffing levels.

We know that you will understand that the safety of everyone in the school community is paramount. We all want to get more pupils back into school as soon as it is safe to do so. However, in supporting schools to re-open in a phased and gradual way, the first priority to consider will be the health and well-being of all pupils and families and the staff.

Whilst all schools are working hard to respond to the guidance provided by the Department for Education, depending on each individual school context, some primary, infant and junior schools may not be able to offer full time provision for the relevant year groups, and any new arrangements may not be introduced exactly from the 1st June. Schools will be writing to parents over the next week to outline the offer and response that they are able to make, which will be based on the health and safety risk assessment that they have been asked to complete.

The guidance made it clear that it is not compulsory for parents to send their children to school at this time and there will be no penalties if you choose to keep your child(ren) at home.

All schools will continue to provide a home learning offer to all pupils not accessing support on site and will also keep in regular touch with the families of all pupils, whether or not they are attending school.

If you are the parent of a child with an Education, Health and Care Plan we will also be writing to you in the next week, via your child's school or setting, to update you on the temporary changes made by the government to the SEND legislation and what this means for your child. We will also be sharing this information via the Local Offer and the Essex Family Forum.

I want to assure you that schools are working closely with the Local Authority and the Headteacher Associations in order to offer a consistent and safe response to the proposed plans.

Finally, I would like to reassure you that the health and safety of children and staff remains everyone's first priority during this period.

If you have any questions regarding this letter, please do contact your school in the first instance.
