Book Fortnight Reports

Class Goldfinch

During book fortnight, our class read the story, 'Mama Panya's Pancakes'. It is a village tale from Kenya. The story is about a character called Adika and his mother, Mama Panya. They set out to the market to buy ingredients to make pancakes. Along the way, Adika meets his friends and, without asking Mama Panya, invites them all to join them for pancakes. Mama Panya worries she will not have enough coins to buy all the ingredients they need. At the end, there is a surprise for Mama Panya and Adika. (We don't want to spoil the story by telling you the ending!)

We learnt meanings of the words in the story, like Rafiki, it means friend. We also enjoyed learning facts about Kenya, the wildlife that could be seen when walking to market and what village life is like.

In our English lessons, we mapped out the story, collecting different adjectives to describe the characters and settings in the story.

Using these word banks, we then changed one of the events in the story. Finally, we planned our version of the story using some of the ingredients that were suggested in the pancake recipe, which was included in the book.






During our recent book fortnight, Class Jay enjoyed sharing the Aboriginal story of Tiddalick, a story of a greedy frog who drinks all the water leaving nothing for the other animals. The children used story mapping to retell the story and then were asked to adapt the story by changing the main character. The children chose farm animals to drink all the water. We were very impressed with their story writing! The children enjoyed dressing up for World Book Day and were enthralled by the stories from the storyteller. They couldn't believe he was able to tell these stories without a book and they were all just in his head!

Class Hummingbird

During Book Fortnight Class Hummingbird explored the story of Encanto and the country of Columbia. The children used their senses to think of adjectives to describe the setting. We created our own characters with Columbian names and created magical doors which represented their powers. We created story maps which had a different problem and resolution in.











The children's characters used their gifts to resolve the problems. We created a collage of the Casita using scrunching, ripping and cutting. We were lucky enough to have our class assembly during this period and we got to share our learning with our parents.

Get set... Danbury Park School is taking part in Sustrans Big Walk and Wheel 2022 (the new name for Big Pedal), the UK's largest inter-school cycling, walking, wheeling and scooting challenge.

What do you need to do?

- Encourage your child(ren) to walk, use a wheelchair, scoot or cycle to school on as many days as possible during the event.
- We want to make sure that everyone can get involved in Sustrans Big Walk and Wheel.
- We know there may be things which make it more difficult for some pupils to take part than others.

Why we are taking part

Sustrans Big Walk and Wheel is a great way to build physical activity in children's daily routine which is important for their physical health and mental wellbeing.

It also links with our school Our World, Our Future project in trying to cut pollution around our school area.

Active school runs help to reduce congestion and air pollution outside the school gate. <u>A 2021 YouGov study</u> showed nearly half of UK children worry about air pollution near their school. And that children thought active travel was the best away to bring down these pollution levels.

Plus there are some great prizes to be won every day if we get enough children taking part!



Safeguarding

Now that the weather is improving and you may be considering letting your older children walk to and from school on their own, it would be a good time to remind them about road safety. Main Road and the roads around the village do get very busy in the mornings and at the end of the school day. We are working with the Parish Council and the local community to improve safety in the village but this will take some time. A gentle refresher in road safety for the children from families would go a long way!

Last week and this week school is participating in the annual *Sustrans Big Walk and Wheel* event (see information above) which inspires pupils, staff and parents to be amazing and take active journeys to school. This would also improve the air quality around the school!

On each day of the challenge, schools compete to see who can get the highest percentage of their pupils, staff and parents cycling, walking, wheeling or scooting to school. The school's best five days will determine our final position so there is still time to take part!

Notification and Reminders

Ink Pen Purchases - As we have moved to becoming a cashless school, the purchase of ink pens now needs to be made via Pay360 and not the school office. You will need to order the pen via the stationery tab on Pay360.

Once we have seen a payment of £1.50 on Pay360 the school office will deliver the pen to the child's classroom.

Pay 360 – Thank you to all the parents who have now joined the new online payments system. Our office staff are happy to support you if you are experiencing difficulties. Please note that we are now well on our way to being a cashless school as part of *Our World, Our Future* project. By having the online system, staff need to make fewer journeys by car to the bank, thus reducing emissions and we are using less paper.




