Weekly Update

This week has turned into an increasingly more challenging time as COVID has taken hold of our school in a way that we have not seen before. We have seen a rise in the number of children infected throughout the school and some have been quite poorly. We have noticed that for some children, it starts with them feeling and being sick and they very quickly deteriorate. We would ask that at this time, if your child says they feel unwell, you err on the side of caution and that you keep your mobile phones to hand in case we need to contact you.

Unfortunately last week I tested positive and only returned to school yesterday but I was only one of many staff members unwell or needing to be with their families. We are very grateful to our team of learning support assistants who have stepped in to cover classes. They know the children well and what they have been learning, so in most cases can pick up the teachers' planning and continue the classroom learning. They have done an admirable job. We always try to engage a supply teacher for longer term staff absence where we can but at this time, this has proved very difficult. COVID has also impacted our school office and Mrs Brooke is currently unwell so our admin assistants are stepping in and doing the best they can in order to keep the school running behind the scenes. There is so much that has to come together to keep a school operational and we would ask that families are patient and understanding at this time.

On a lighter note the children looked great today as they embraced the opportunity to dress up and celebrate our Book Fortnight. Photos will be in next weeks' newsletter along with some reports from the classes. At the time of writing we have only raised £288, it is still not too late to send in a donation to help cover the cost of Mike Dodsworth, the storyteller, who is visiting next Friday. Please note that this year, we are not collecting for Comic Relief. We respect that many families may be under financial pressure at the moment, so we will leave you to support the charity in whatever way you wish.

We have been asked to pass on information about the Sustainable Danbury's community seed swap event on 12 March at 2pm at St John's Church Meeting Room.:



Safeguarding

Prevent Duty

In July 2015, the **Counter-Terrorism and Security Act 2015** placed a new duty on schools and other providers of education and care, in the exercise of their functions to have 'due regard to the need to prevent people from being drawn into terrorism'. The guidance states that schools should be safe spaces in which children and young people can understand and discuss sensitive topics, including terrorism and the extremist ideas that are part of terrorist ideology, and learn how to challenge these ideas.

This aspect of safeguarding and child protection is regularly included as part of our regular programme of staff training. At Danbury Park School we take seriously our duty to:

- Teach a broad and balanced curriculum which promotes spiritual, moral, cultural, mental and physical development of pupils and prepares them for the opportunities, responsibilities and experiences of life and must promote community cohesion;
- Be safe spaces in which children can understand and discuss sensitive topics, including terrorism and the extremist ideas that are part of terrorist ideology, and learn how to challenge these ideas;
- Be mindful of our existing duties to forbid political indoctrination and secure a balanced presentation of political issues.

Our children do love to engage in discussions and debates and they are confident to share their thoughts and also what they have heard, so our staff have a good overview. Parents can play their part by discussing topical issues through presenting a balanced view, so that the children can be supported in drawing their own conclusions.

If we are ever concerned, we will contact parents and we are here to help, should you need it.

Let's work together to keep the children safe!

Notification and Reminders

Food and Drink in School – Please remember to check any food brought into school for nuts. We have children and staff with potentially fatal allergies so we are a nut free environment. With Natasha's Law now in force, we are having to tighten up on treats brought into school, so we are sorry but we cannot distribute treats brought into school to mark your child's birthday. Please save these for your child's party or celebration.

Please send your child in with suitable unbreakable water bottles. No glass bottles are permitted.

Pay 360 – Thank you to all the parents who have now joined the new online payments system. Our office staff are happy to support you if you are experiencing difficulties. Please note that we are now well on our way to being a cashless school as part of *Our World, Our Future* project. By having the online system, staff need to make fewer journeys by car to the bank, thus reducing emissions and we are using less paper.
