Tuck Shop Returns

We as a school are delighted to announce that the tuck shop will be re-opening after the Easter Holidays. Some children from Year five and Year six will be chosen to run the stall daily. As we are a nut free school we will not allow any products containing nuts. On the other hand, the school will be rewarded with a treat day on Friday allowing them to bring in cake and healthy treats.

Please do not bring in any crisps, chocolates and sweets as they contain too much sugar. Various fruits will be sold and vegetables along with cereal bars for the children to enjoy. The system will work with the children coming into the hall in the morning to buy their fruit and go back to their classrooms.

We are pleased that the DPSA and Mrs Backshall, Class Budgerigar's LSA, have offered to help us run the tuck shop. We need a few days after Easter to get the fruit, vegetables and cereal bars in stock so we plan to open fully on **Monday 25th April**.

Please support the children in their endeavours to promote a balanced diet and healthy life-styles and choices. The children in the infants all receive free fruit and vegetables so unless school is aware of a medical need, they do not bring in any tuck. In the juniors we want to move away from the salty snacks, chocolate bars and sweets that have started to creep in since the pandemic started. These are not good nutritionally and although may be eaten as treats, we ask that these are saved for after-school or weekends.

Earth Day – Friday 22nd April

This year Earth Day is on Friday 22nd April 2022 and the theme is "Invest in our Planet" which ties in very well with the school's *Our World, Our Future* project. During the week the children will be finding out more about their class's special area of responsibility in promoting environmental awareness and how we take care of this in school.

We would like to invite the children to come into school on Friday 22nd in non-uniform dressed in green,

brown or florals. Just remember that we still go out to play so clothes do need to be practical and suitable for the weather. We want to take this day as an opportunity to brighten up our school and consider the wildlife so we are asking for a donation of either a plant, some bulbs or seeds – all of which are readily available at supermarkets at this time of year. Mrs Gooding will be starting up her KS2 gardening club again and wants to get growing vegetables with the children but we also want to create a sensory and quiet area around the gazebos and include flowering and evergreen shrubs for the insects. At home you can also join in and these are a few suggestions for promoting a good family discussion:

COVID Guidance from 1st April

The government has issued the following guidance:

The population now has much stronger protection against COVID-19 than at any other point in the pandemic. This means we can begin to manage the virus like other respiratory infections, thanks to the success of the vaccination programme and access to antivirals, alongside natural immunity and increased scientific and public understanding about how to manage risk.

Unless we receive information from the Local Authority to the contrary the following procedures will apply:

- Children and young people who are unwell and have a high temperature should stay at home and avoid contact with other people. They can go back to school, college or childcare when they no longer have a high temperature, and they are well enough to attend.
- Adults with the symptoms of a respiratory infection, and who have a high temperature or feel unwell, should try to stay at home and avoid contact with other people until they feel well enough to resume normal activities and they no longer have a high temperature.
- Adults with a positive COVID-19 test result should try to stay at home and avoid contact with other people for 5 days, which is when they are most infectious. For children and young people aged 18 and under, the advice will be 3 days.

Notification and Reminders

Ink Pen Purchases - As we have moved to becoming a cashless school, the purchase of ink pens now needs to be made via Pay360 and not the school office. You will need to order the pen via the stationery tab on Pay360.

Once we have seen a payment of £1.50 on Pay360 the school office will deliver the pen to the child's classroom.

Pay 360 – Thank you to all the parents who have now joined the new online payments system. Our office staff are happy to support you if you are experiencing difficulties. Please note that we are now well on our way to being a cashless school as part of *Our World, Our Future* project. By having the online system, staff need to make fewer journeys by car to the bank, thus reducing emissions and we are using less paper.
