## Weekly Update

Last Thursday was National Poetry Day and the theme this year was the environment. In assembly we read *Litter is Rubbish* by Tony Walsh which was a funny poem playing on words but with a serious message. At break and lunch times the children were given the opportunity to write some poems of their own and they were very keen to get started. Some even wrote poems at home over the weekend. Many took the autumnal scene around them as inspiration and we have included a selection of their poems below.

Next week we have our parent consultation meetings, where you will have the opportunity to meet your child's class teacher and find out how they have settled in their new class. These meetings take place in the classrooms and you will need to enter the school via the main entrance. There is an opportunity to look at your child's work either before or after the meeting and for classes A, B, C, D, E and F the work will be in the children's trays in the hall, with each class on one table. The work for classes G, H and J will be outside the classrooms.

Each appointment is for 10 minutes and we ask that at your allotted time, you knock on the classroom door and enter the room. Class E is accessed through Class F. We do not run a bell system so it is important that you attend the meeting on time so that teachers keep to the schedule. Should you have an important issue that requires longer than 10 minutes then we will make another mutually convenient appointment with you. Whilst we appreciate that childcare can be a problem, it is best if you leave your children with a family member or friend. The children are not invited into the classrooms so they would have to wait in the hall or corridor where they would be unsupervised.

This week we were treated to the infant Harvest Celebrations. It was reassuring to have another step back to normality with the children singing their songs, performing their poems and telling us about the food collection for the Chelmsford Food Bank. Thank you to all the families who donated so generously. The parcels were collected last Friday and will help support many families.

## **Notification and Reminders**

**Pay 360** – Thank you to all the parents who have now joined the new online payments system. Our office staff are happy to support you if you are experiencing difficulties. Please note that we are now well on our way to being a cashless school as part of *Our World, Our Future* project. By having the online system, staff need to make fewer journeys by car to the bank, thus reducing emissions and we are using less paper.

**Ink Pens** – We have now moved away from using fountain pens in the classroom and are using Berol Writing Pens. These will be provided by the school. However if you are happy to supply your child with a good quality ink pen with blue cartridges, then they will be allowed to continue using them. Please note that biros and gel pens are not allowed and if a child needs a different type of pen because of a specific problem, then we will provide them.

**Free School Meals** – Due to Covid-19 we understand that your circumstances may have changed or may change in the near future and you may now be eligible for free school meals. This is the eligibility criteria ECC use: <u>Entitlement and what is required</u>

The Government set the criteria for free school meal entitlement. To be entitled, you need to receive: Universal Credit with an annual income of £7,400 or less

- Income Support
- Income Based Job Seekers Allowance
- Income Related Employment & Support Allowance
- Pension Guarantee Credit
- Child Tax Credit (But not working tax credit) with an annual income of less than £16,190
- Parents with Asylum Seeker status who receive support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- Working Tax Credit 'Run-on' the payment someone may receive for a further 4 weeks after they stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit
