End of Year Reminders

School Dinners

Last week the governing body met and sadly we had to take the decision to raise the cost of a school dinner to £2.70 with effect from September. With the recent increased staffing costs and the escalating cost of ingredients, the school has been subsidising school meals now for the past few months and with the pressure on our budget this cannot be sustained. We, therefore, have no alternative than to pass these costs onto parents.

All children in EYFS and KS1 continue to be entitled to Universal Free School Meals and the government is raising the contribution that the school receives. If your child is moving into Year 3, please remember that you will need to start paying for meals from September. These should be paid for in advance.

If you think that you qualify for free school meals, then please let us know and we will advise you on the action you need to take.

We feel that our school meals are nutritious and provide good value for money, so we will not compromise on quality or from using fresh ingredients. The children tell us that they enjoy their hot meals and the high numbers of children eating them each day with very little waste, is testament to this.

Ear Piercing

Essex County Council insist that earrings must be removed for PE lessons, so if you are considering having your child's ears pierced, please arrange for this to be done at the beginning of the school holidays to allow time to heal and for time for the children to practise taking them in and out. Staff are not allowed to remove or put in earrings so children need to be able to do this themselves or not wear earrings to school on the days we have PE or after-school sports clubs. We suggest that you put a small box in their PE bag to keep the earrings safe. Please note that pupils are not allowed to wear tape over their earrings.

After School Clubs

Parents should now be able to book places with Premier Sports for after school clubs starting in September. Please note that the Tuesday Football Club for younger children will now be run by Premier Sport and not Chelmsford City. Sadly, next year Art Club will no longer be taking place as Nikki is very busy with her studio. We would like to thank her for all her support and enthusiasm over the many years she has run her club.

Clothing

Over the weekend as you wash and put away the school uniform and during the holidays buy new, please check that name labels are clearly visible and intact. We try very hard to re-unite lost property with their owners and this is much easier for everyone if we can read the names.

Hanging Basket Competition

Earlier this year each class planted up a hanging basket to display outside their classroom and they have been looking after them carefully through hot, dry spells and windy days.

GOVERNOR NEWSLETTER Summer Term 2023



Dear Parents/carers,

At time of writing, I have just returned from a hastily re-arranged sports day for KS1. It is hugely frustrating that the English summer did not bless us with some basic dry weather on the day the event was originally planned. Nevertheless, the smiles on the pupils' faces show just how resilient they are to whatever life throws their way. What a pleasure it was to see the participation and enthusiasm across the whole school for the traditional end of term event.

This period of the year is always a bitter-sweet milestone. It is very sad to say goodbye to our year 6 cohort, but having had the opportunity to speak to them, it is fantastic to hear their positive experiences of their time at Danbury Park. This is a direct reflection of everything the staff have put into supporting the pupils, along with the level of pupil engagement, over the preceding 7 years.

For those parents that are new to Danbury Park, and are reading this newsletter for the first time, then welcome! I hope to get to know many of you in the months ahead, and there are plenty of opportunities to get involved in the school that I can assure you are rewarding!

A termly update from each of the Committees is presented below:

Curriculum and Pupil Related – Chair, Mrs. Katherine Moulding

Pupil progress was reviewed and the following was noted:

- Good progress was made in Early Years and KS1.
- Interventions were put in place and reviewed for Year 2
- Year 3 targets were met
- Year 6 completed the SATS and the reading paper was noted as challenging.
- The governors noted the success of the residential visit for year 6, while recognising the challenges of hosting in future years.
- Frequency of monitoring visits have increased and governor engagement with pupils and classes is strengthening.
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<u>Resources Committee –</u> Chair, Mr. George Fraser

- Over the course of this term, the committee reviewed the overall fabric of the outside of the school, including the bungalow used by Woodlands and the outdoor facilities. It was pleasing to see the general good condition of many of the outside facilities. The bungalow will need some remedial action over the summer holidays and use of the school during the period of interruption was agreed.
- On finance matters, the electronic payments system Pay360, has been withdrawn by its provider and the school has moved to Parentpay - the same system used by a number of other schools in the area.
- The Committee focused on the current budgetary constraints on the school system to ensure best value for pupils. It was necessary to increase the cost of school meal pricing at the start of the September term by 20p to allow the catering department to break even. Whilst any price rise is regrettable, balance was sought between the need for a suitable quality of meal vs pricing. Pricing and costs will be reviewed on a termly basis.
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Personnel – Chair, Mrs. Debbie Le Monde

Personnel matters were discussed and the following highlights were noted:

- The school is fully staffed, except for MDAs.
- ⁴ Turnover in the SENDCo position was noted, and the appointment of a successor was discussed.
- A Staff wellbeing survey was conducted and is under review.

That leaves me simply to offer my heartfelt thanks to all of the staff for everything they have done over the course of the last year. On behalf of the governing body, I wish all pupils, parents, staff and their families a fantastic summer break and I look forward to seeing you all in September.

Developed in collaboration with the <u>Youth Sport Trust</u>, the 2023 Summer Reading Challenge will celebrate play and participation, encouraging children to get involved in games and sports in any way that best suits them.

The Summer Reading Challenge is produced by <u>The Reading Agency</u> and delivered in partnership with libraries. The challenge, aimed at children aged 4 - 11 years, is to read six or more library books over the summer.

Safeguarding

Please see below a message from the Essex Safeguarding Children Board regarding their Online Safety campaign which reinforces the importance of talking about safe internet use with children.

Find out more about spotting the signs of exploitation, checking device security settings and how to report concerns

The summer holidays are fast approaching and while more time may be spent outside away from screens, it's important to remember that the risk of online harm and child exploitation doesn't disappear.

Parents and carers should remain aware of their child's internet use over the summer - as much as any other time of year. Child exploitation and grooming often starts with contact on social media. Any child is at risk and it's important to remember that both boys and girls can be groomed. This is why it's vital that everyone knows how to spot the signs and knows what to do if they suspect abuse.

Children may see friends less over the holidays due to other family commitments and if they're feeling isolated, they may turn increasingly to their devices. This could increase the risk of online harms such as grooming, accessing inappropriate gaming and chat forums, as well as affecting their emotional wellbeing.

From the 10-16 July the Essex Safeguarding Children Board (ESCB) and partners are encouraging people across Essex to take part in sharing messages about online safety across social media. The week of activity will cover topics including youth involved sexual images, online gaming and online safety for pre-schoolers. There will be information on how to support young people to have healthy relationships in a digital world and the importance of supporting them to understand the dangers that technology can present with relationships.

The <u>ESCB website</u> has resources for parents, carers and professionals including podcasts, videos, how to report concerns and information about spotting the signs of exploitation.

It is important to remember that exploitation is not the child's fault and they are never to blame. By creating a supportive environment, where online safety is discussed in the same way as road safety or stranger danger, children may feel able to speak more openly about any concerns they may have.

David Archibald, ESCB Independent Chair/Facilitator on behalf of the Statutory Partners said: "I would encourage all parents and carers, no matter how tech savvy they think they are, to double check that their children's devices have the correct parental controls and to have a discussion with their children about the importance of safe internet use – take an interest in what games they are playing and try to understand their online world.

"Online exploitation is a horrific crime and can have a significant impact on the lives of the individuals, families and communities involved. Together we can support children and parents to be aware of the dangers and know there is someone to talk to if they're concerned."

Concerns about child exploitation can be reported anonymously via Crimestoppers 0800 555111. There is also a dedicated Essex Police Child Exploitation hotline - for parents, carers and members of the public to seek advice around concerns they may have about their own or other children with regards to criminal and sexual exploitation: 01245 452058.

Attendance

Part of our safeguarding duties and procedures is ensuring that when children are absent from school, we know where they are and that they are safe. Please remember to inform school by **9.20am each day** if your child is absent from school and to follow this up with a written letter of explanation on their return. If we do not know where your child is, we are required to use the emergency contact numbers you have given to school. So, it is vitally important that if you change your phone numbers, or your family and friends do, that you inform us.

The government, local authority and school take attendance seriously and school is required to follow up on irregular attendance and prolonged absences and also for unauthorised absences, so please do not be offended when we ask for proof of doctors' and dentists' appointment or ask for details of holiday bookings or delayed flights or sickness on return after school holidays.

Important information - Term time holidays

Improving school attendance is a key priority for all schools across Essex. Where families choose to take a family holiday during term time, this can detrimentally impact a pupil's progress and can prevent them from fulfilling their true academic potential. Our school attendance policy, available via our school website, clearly sets out the process that parents should follow if they wish to apply for leave during term time. Please note that applications should only be made, if you feel that there are exceptional circumstances which mean that the leave cannot be taken during the school holidays.

We would ask all parents to note that, where families choose to go on holiday during term time and the absences are coded as unauthorised, Essex County Council may not issue penalty notices and may instead proceed to prosecution and place the case directly before the Magistrates for their consideration in court. If found guilty by the Magistrates, parents could face a fine of up to £2,500 and/or 3 months imprisonment.

Danbury Park School Lottery

We would like to remind parents about the school lottery and thank those who regularly donate their winnings back to the school.

The Schools' Lottery is where parents can take part in a weekly draw with proceeds going to the school. In a year we usually raise over £1 000 which we spend on special projects like the EYFS outdoor classroom and which we could not otherwise afford. Every little contribution helps!

- Parents with Asylum Seeker status who receive support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- Working Tax Credit 'Run-on' the payment someone may receive for a further 4 weeks after they stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit
