Bikeability





This week saw the start of the Year 6 Bikeability course where the children learn about riding safely on the roads. The children work in small groups with two instructors on an intensive two-day programme, initially on the playground and then progressing out onto the local roads.

This programme is invaluable in building the children's confidence and independence and in setting them up for the transition to secondary school.



Year 4 Science Club - Week 1 Egg Drop!

This week the year 4 science club started with a splat! Mrs Marsland dropped eggs on the floor - what was going on?

It was an eggsalent investigation where we found out where the egg shell was strongest and weakest. The children discussed why there were these differences and decided that it would be important that



the egg stay intact when it was first laid and then when the chick was ready to come out it would need to be able to peck where it is weakest. Where do you think the egg would be strongest and weakest?

The group were told that one of Farmer Tim's hens keeps laying eggs on a high surface in the hen house. He's losing lots of eggs as they fall off the surface and smash when they hit the floor. The surface is 1 metre from the ground. The challenge was to make an egg protector using junk materials.















The children selected from a variety of fabrics, card, paper, corrugated card, felt, wool and masking tape.

Daniel and Amber discussed where the chicken would lay the egg so they thought about using a variety of materials to cushion the landing as well as trying to direct where it fell.







The Science of Eggs

All unsupported objects fall towards the Earth due to the force of gravity acting between the Earth and the object. There will be some air resistance pushing back on the egg as it moves through the air, but this is small due to the small surface area of the egg.

An egg is stronger at its top and bottom because of its more domed/arched shape at these points, which distributes any force applied more effectively than across its side. This would be where a force is applied if a hen sits on an egg. The strength of the shell is weaker at the sides (much less domed) and this is where a chick needs to crack the shell to get out. Therefore, greater force can be applied to the ends of an egg before it cracks.

What a great first session. The next science club will be held on Wednesday 11th October and is entitled, "Escape!" They will need to bring a small figure like a playmobile or lego figure (to give an idea of size) and small margarine tubs or foil trays.

Year 6 School Journey

A few weeks ago Mrs Marsland, Class Avocet's teacher met with the parents of the children to explain about the residential school journey that we have planned for June 2024. That may seem a long way off but these activities take a lot of planning and forethought. School Journey has been a fixture in the school diary for many years but as a school we are now at a point where we are having to re-think how this will work in the future.

With rising costs, and school only able to ask parents to contribute to specific aspects of the visit, we are now having to subsidise the week by some £ 2,500. This is mostly because of the additional staffing costs that are required and as you will know there is increasing pressure on school budgets. Over the past three years school has struggled to find enough staff who are able to commit to a week away. Our staff have families and personal commitments and last year we came so close to cancelling the journey as there were insufficient staff members who could go. In the end, thanks to Mrs Ayris and Mrs Barker, LSAs, who came forward at the last minute, the journey could proceed but they both had children in Year 6 and for them, having mum around all day, the school journey was not quite the same.

This year we continue to face the challenge of finding enough staff to supervise the children safely, so we have taken the decision that the Year 6 School Journey, in its current format, cannot continue. We felt it only fair to let parents and children know in advance so that their expectations can be managed.

We are already investigating exciting alternative excursions linked to the curriculum that will take place in the summer of 2025. We want the children to leave Danbury Park School with lasting fond memories, so the children will still have a programme of different exciting experiences to look forward to.



Walk to School Month



Attendance

Part of our safeguarding duties and procedures is ensuring that when children are absent from school, we know where they are and that they are safe. Please remember to inform school by **9.20am each day** if your child is absent from school and to follow this up with a written letter of explanation on their return. If we do not know where your child is, we are required to use the emergency contact numbers you have given to school. So, it is vitally important that if you change your phone numbers, or your family and friends do, that you inform us.

The government, local authority and school take attendance seriously and school is required to follow up on irregular attendance and prolonged absences and also for unauthorised absences, so please do not be offended when we ask for proof of doctors' and dentists' appointment or ask for details of holiday bookings or delayed flights or sickness on return after school holidays. The government is also asking parents to send their children into school with mild illnesses and we would, of course, contact you should their condition deteriorate.

Important information - Term time holidays

Improving school attendance is a key priority for all schools across Essex. Where families choose to take a family holiday during term time, this can detrimentally impact a pupil's progress and can prevent them from fulfilling their true academic potential. Our school attendance policy, available via our school website, clearly sets out the process that parents should follow if they wish to apply for leave during term time. Please note that applications should only be made, if you feel that there are exceptional circumstances which mean that the leave cannot be taken during the school holidays.

We would ask all parents to note that, where families choose to go on holiday during term time and the absences are coded as unauthorised, Essex County Council may not issue penalty notices and may instead proceed to prosecution and place the case directly before the Magistrates for their consideration in court. If found guilty by the Magistrates, parents could face a fine of up to £2,500 and/or 3 months imprisonment.

Secondary School Places for September 2024

The application period for Year 7 entry in September 2024 opens this week and parents of Year 6 children who live in Essex can apply for a secondary school place on the Essex Education Portal on their website. Parents have until <u>31</u>st <u>October</u> to submit an application.

Parents who live in other Local Authority areas such as Southend or Thurrock must apply to their own Local Authority, but they can name Essex schools on the application.

Parents of children with an EHCP should not apply (except for grammar schools); their transfers will be arranged by the SEND Ops Team.

For parents who cannot apply online or who prefer to apply on paper, ECC have a paper application form that can be printed from the ECC website: <u>Admissions booklets</u>, <u>policies and forms</u>: <u>Application forms | Essex County Council</u> or they can request from ECC that one to be posted to them.

Safeguarding

At Danbury Park School we take e-safety seriously. At the beginning of every school year, as part of our computing curriculum, our pupils are taught about E-safety. This is then re-visited every term to reinforce the message of personal safety. The elements of computing are embedded across all subjects in the curriculum and our pupils regularly use the internet as part of their learning. In school, we use a filtering system to prevent children accessing inappropriate sites.

Over the past years we have also organised parent information workshops to help families keep abreast of the new technology with the aim of helping keep the children safe at home.

Our top tips are:

- Set up your computer in a shared area at home so that you can see the sites your children are accessing;
- Set your security levels so that you can limit access to sites and time spent on electronic devices;
- Talk to your child about what they are doing online;
- Talk to your child about keeping their personal information private.

Notification and Reminders

School Gateway — Thank you to all the parents who have now joined the new online payment system. Please ensure that you download the app as per the letter sent out at the end of last term. Payments for school dinners and trips need to be made via this app. Please note that we are now well on our way to being a cashless school as part of *Our World, Our Future* project. By having the online system, staff need to make fewer journeys by car to the bank, thus reducing emissions and we are using less paper.

Measles – The Primary Health Care Trust has asked us to remind parents about the measles vaccine, which is available through GP surgeries. They are anxious to vaccinate all children to prevent an outbreak of a potentially dangerous disease.

Ink Pens – We have now moved away from using fountain pens in the classroom and will going forward encourage the children to use Berol Writing Pens. These will be provided by the school.

Free School Meals — Due to Covid-19 we understand that your circumstances may have changed or may change in the near future and you may now be eligible for free school meals. To check eligibility please contact Essex County Council on 0345 603 2200 or for more information and online application go to https://www.gov.uk/apply-free-school-meals

This is the eligibility criteria ECC use:

Entitlement and what is required

The Government set the criteria for free school meal entitlement. To be entitled, you need to receive:

- Universal Credit with an annual income of £7,400 or less
- Income Support
- Income Based Job Seekers Allowance
- Income Related Employment & Support Allowance
- Pension Guarantee Credit
- Child Tax Credit (But not working tax credit) with an annual income of less than £16,190
- Parents with Asylum Seeker status who receive support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- Working Tax Credit 'Run-on' the payment someone may receive for a further 4 weeks after they stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit
